

The rest are rooted in surrounding villages and a nearby town, several of which are expanding through new housing developments, opening exciting missional opportunities.

Our circuit is served by a dedicated team: three full-time (we currently have a vacancy) and one part-time presbyters, two active supernumeraries, five local lay pastors, one lay associate minister and two lay workers, alongside a part-time administrator who keeps the circuit office running smoothly. I hope this magazine introduces you to all the diversity and uniqueness of our circuit. May it encourage you that this is a thriving circuit, with lots of energy and vision for the future. We are all missional minded to see people embrace God's love and come to know Him for themselves.

Pastoral Letter

As we embark on the journey of the new Charnwood and Mowbray circuit, I am sure that there will be conversations about the structures and the implementation of policies and procedures, of finding our place and voice and the voices of our church communities in a larger grouping, as well as getting to know new people.

In this edition of the circuit magazine, Karen has written an introduction and I don't want to duplicate ideas, so I want to go with the deeply personal. And as I share a little about what makes me tick as a person of faith I want to invite you to reflect on what it is that encourages you or inspires you in your relationship with God; what is it that is essential for you? Maybe the answer includes gatherings at church for worship and fellowship or study and prayer. Or maybe it is about more personal space for reflection with God, or the application of your faith in everyday living. But what are the sources that encourage and inspire; that deepen or enable your relationship with God. When I think about what is essential, I am really thinking what it is that sustains me, leads me and challenges me and brings me closer to God. Some of you already know, and others will get to know, that a particular book *Revelations of Divine Love* by Julian of Norwich is still both a treasure

and gift for me. And over the last few weeks, I have found myself being drawn back again (happens regularly!) to *Celtic Daily Prayer*, the worship book of the Northumbria Community, and particularly to the liturgy for evening prayer.

I am not a scholar of Celtic spirituality, but for me, in my experiencing, it invites me to hold an awareness of God who is constantly present around me, without me and within me; of the God who is present in those with whom I meet and the challenge and reminder that God may be present in my interactions and words to others.

For me, to be able to speak in that way requires a turning to God, but also somehow being tuned in to God. Are my actions and words (spoken or written in an email) those that will encourage and affirm the other within the love of God, or will they undermine or criticise the other or will they be more about self-defensiveness and trying to justify myself?

When I am looking more to God than myself, when I know that I am closer to God's grace than my own limited capabilities and when I am more deeply aware of God's love holding and sustaining me, I somehow have a greater capacity for patience, compassion, creating a space for the other and maybe be able to come closer to the words of the hymn: brother, sister let me serve you, let me be as Christ to you.

In the end, I believe that that is what we are called to be to one another within the community of the church, and as a community of Christ within the world. We may withdraw from some of the ways of the world which are not the ways of God, and we may withdraw from some of the things of the world, that are some kind of God or love substitute, but, we are not called to withdraw from God's world, but to be God's light and salt to transform it. In John's gospel (John 3:16 & 17) we find a reminder that God's love for the world was so great in Jesus there was not judgement but salvation and life. My understanding of Celtic spirituality grounds me in the goodness and love

of God that is all around me – gifts for me to see and receive, that I might live with gratitude and joy for and in the things of God; a sense of the constant presence of God (whether I feel it or not) the one who I can trust and whom I can turn to and with whom I can nurture the desire to be in constant communion with; and a groundedness in the one who is the source of all being and who calls me into a recognition of community as the expression of discipleship living.

Local, congregation-led chaplaincy is one of the most effective ways to collaborate in God's mission in the world; local people responding to local needs over time can change the world!

This connexional year, the Loughborough circuit has had a chaplaincy, which is in its infancy with just one chaplain: Dr Karen Ette. However, after Easter, five others attended the seven-week *Chaplaincy Everywhere* course, which was held at Knightthorpe Methodist Church on Tuesday mornings.

Chaplaincy Everywhere is designed to be used in a small group of three to eight people, beginning with the mission of God and ending with the practical details of who is going to do what and where; this material mixes deep reflection, individual and group exercises as well as practical resources to lead you to respond to your local community.

Over seven sessions, the group journeyed together – from reflecting on God's mission, to considering practical ways of serving their communities. With a mix of discussion, personal reflection, group exercises and practical tools, the course encouraged each person to ask: Where might God be calling me?

Looking ahead, our new chaplains will be commissioned early in the first quarter of the next connexional year. We are excited to welcome them and to support one another as we share in this important work together.



Gardening Club: This group meets regularly — every Wednesday from 2pm to 4pm until December — to tend both the community garden and the church's back garden.

Participants are welcome to attend all sessions or drop in as their schedule allows — and there's always tea and cake after each session.

Future plans include a memorial and tranquillity garden opposite the vegetable garden where people will be able to take time to sit and reflect in a beautiful setting.



Patchwork workshop (14th June): We were grateful to welcome Chris Watkins back to lead another inspiring craft workshop. She generously shared her skills and insights into designing and creating patchwork. Participants enjoyed a cosy, creative Saturday morning together, each taking home a tailor-made patchwork coaster.

Summer Party and Summer Festival (5th July):

We hosted another open-door celebration, welcoming everyone to explore our community garden and church space, which had been beautifully decorated with floral arrangements by Monica Oliver. Activities included a repair café (led by a volunteer skilled in electrical and mechanical repairs), flower pot painting, a craft station, and live music. We were delighted to see friends and



members of the church and circuit, as well as supporters from Incredible Edible Loughborough and the wider local community, come together and connect. A heartfelt thank you to all our volunteers and visitors.

Flower pot decoupage workshop (26th July):

In another creative session led by Chris Watkins, participants learned to decoupage napkins onto clay flower pots. Friends from the church and local community took part, expressing their creativity through custom designs that turned ordinary pots into unique decorative pieces.

Long Clawson

Greetings from Long Clawson Methodist Church.

We are a church in the Vale of Belvoir, 6 miles north of Melton Mowbray. There has been a chapel on this site since 1801, being replaced for a larger building in 1840. Then in January 1954, for reasons never discovered, this chapel burnt down. Our present building was opened in September 1956.



We have a regular attendance averaging 12 people at our Sunday morning worship. A weekly Baby & Toddler group is held on a Wednesday morning during term time, which has been running for over 30 years, with some of the original 'toddlers' now bringing their own children!

On the 2nd Saturday in the month we have a Coffee Morning, 10.30am to 12noon, for anyone to drop in for a cuppa and a chat, which is appreciated as other events held in the village happen during the weekdays.

In Long Clawson there are two other churches, Baptist and Church of England, and some time ago we formed a group called 'Long Clawson Christians Together'. We share an outdoor service for Remembrance Sunday and on Palm Sunday we take a service walking around the village with a donkey. Also on Good Friday, we do the same carrying the cross.

Melton Mowbray

Hello to all readers.

At Melton Methodist, we are eager to meet the members from what was the Loughborough circuit, as we join to make the new Charnwood and Mowbray Methodist Circuit. We



all want to get to know each other, so it is helpful to have a magazine to enable this.

Our building was until recently known as Sandy Lane Methodist Church. It was built in 1970 among new housing in the south of the town, instigated by the then two town centre churches. 18 months ago, Sage Cross Methodist Church, the remaining church in the centre of Melton, sadly had to close, as there were serious problems with the property. Most of the members came to Sandy Lane, and we became Melton Mowbray Methodist Church. This has been a successful move, as we were both struggling to find enough people to fill all the offices, and now we are stronger working together as one new church.

We are still in the early stages of change but are supported by dedicated people. Last year, our Presbyter was on long term sick leave, so we were very dependent on our lay pastor, Jenny Oliver and our other Lay Pastor, Janet Norburn. They still do tremendous work. Also helping us in our circuit was Rev Karen Beecham, who took on the role of Superintendent Minister. In September, we welcomed Rev Nina Austin as our new part time Presbyter, who had done some work with us in previous years. She has given us exceptional support in so many ways, such as getting to know people by visiting them, and welcoming them into the manse for social occasions, and discussion groups. She has led us in thoughtful and varied forms of worship.

We have always tried to make our church a welcoming place. Thinking of the

property, we have made a good start on making it look smarter. This is an ongoing project. We hire the premises out, and this helps with our upkeep. Unfortunately, we have recently lost our main hirer, as they have moved to larger premises, so we are publicising availability for additional users. The building already acts as a local asset hosting six community groups and is a popular venue for children's birthday parties.

In the life of the church, we have a Choir, a Fellowship Group, a group for adults with Learning Disabilities, a Bereavement group, a House Group, and a Toddler group. On a Sunday, we have an average of 45 adults, and a group for children. We use material from "Roots" based on the Lectionary, so that it fits in with the Service theme. The children show us what they have been doing in a Show and Tell spot at the end of the service. The service is recorded and is available online and on DVD, for those unable to attend.

An especially important aspect of the church is its caring nature. We have an active Pastoral Committee very much supported on an informal individual basis.

Our main purpose at church is mission. In June, we held our Knitted Bible weekend, to which a few of our Loughborough circuit friends came. We have a collection of 31 stories from the bible, comprising 3D knitted scenes and characters. It needs to be seen to be believed! It was visited by a local school, a care home and a residential home for people with Learning Disabilities.

The Knitted Bible collection is available in part or as a whole, for use at other churches. Individual stories are in frequent use with some of our groups.

We are still in the stage of exploring our potential as a church that has effectively grown in numbers, with further ideas of how we can share our love of God in our community and beyond.

We are aware that God has many plans for us to spread the Good News. We certainly have no room for complacency, but through prayer, we can achieve remarkable things.

St Bartholomew's United Church, Quorn

For the benefit of our brothers and sisters in the former Melton Mowbray Circuit it would be as well to explain who we are. At Pentecost in 1975 Quorn Methodist Church came together in unity with the Parish Church of St Bartolomew. Though never a



formal LEP the two congregations became one and, by agreement after a few years, chose to worship exclusively in the 800 year old parish church. Since then QUC has been fully part of both its Methodist Circuit and Anglican Diocese, paying Assessment to each and with a single Church Council.

For the last four years we have been without a Vicar but never without a Methodist Minister. Worship is led by a variety of ministers from both denominations and reflecting both traditions. Weekly attendance at services ranges between 50 and 60 and is increasing. Trinity, Loughborough

As I write this piece the building project at Trinity called "Open the Doors" is just over a week old but by the time you read this it should be more than halfway through its 8 week schedule. The idea of this project is to utilise space at the end of the hall wing downside with a small meeting room being created. We are also creating office and storage space for the playgroup to utilise



such that they no longer prevent the rest of the building being used when they are meeting. Once this is complete around the end of September, we need to further develop what we can do with the building. We already have plans and volunteers to run a once weekly coffee hour largely for playgroup parents but also anyone else who wants to come along. There are thoughts of possible FEAST groups but these need firming up. It also opens up space for additional lettings to potentially help the finances.

A week after the scheme is due to finish, we have our harvest weekend with a harvest supper of jacket potatoes, chilli or bolognaise served at 6:15pm on Saturday 4th October. This will be followed by a quiz prepared by Hedley. All are welcome and hopefully you should be able to see the finished rooms if the work has gone to schedule. Karen will be leading our harvest service the following day.

Our various groups are about to start meeting again after the summer. We have Monday @2 which is a group meeting with a speaker that runs on the first and third Mondays of each month. We have home church groups meeting on two evenings a week and once during the day. These also run fortnightly. Girls and Boys Brigades plus a Brigades Band run during term time. We have a young adults FEAST group bible study that meets fortnightly. There is a choir rehearsal on a Friday evening. There are other choirs that rehearse on our premises and in particular the Male Voice Choir have a concert on 25th October at Trinity.

We also have various links with the Loughborough Baptist and URC churches with Christian Aid lunches and a joint service most quarters. We are trying to arrange something together - probably a walk of witness or drama for Good Friday next year. In addition, we have around 3 services a year jointly with the Chinese congregation who hold their service after ours. The latest one was held on 17th August and was shown on the 12th church. If you wanted to see how this works and how uplifting it is to have a full church, mixing two different cultures and languages, the video will still be available until 16th September on the 12th church Facebook page. Finally, we have a jazz vespers service in the evening once a quarter with music by our own 'Chris Hill Jazz' band. This is widely appreciated and normally brings in people from across the circuit and from local churches.

There is a lot that goes on at Trinity already, but once we have the building more available during the week, time will tell what else we can do!
